

Welshpool High School Privacy Notice

What the School, Powys Local Authority and Welsh Government does with the Educational Information they hold on Children and Young People

Subject

To meet the requirements of the Data Protection Act 1998, schools are required to issue a Privacy Notice to children and young people and/or parents and guardians summarising the information held on record about children and young people, why it is held, and the third parties to whom it may be passed.

This Privacy Notice provides information about the collection and processing of children's or young people's personal and performance information by the Welsh Government, Powys Local Authority (LA) and Welshpool High School.

The collection of personal information

The school collects information about children and young people and their parents or legal guardians when children and young people enrol at the school. The school also collects information at other key times during the school year and may receive information from other schools when children and young people transfer.

The **School** processes the information it collects to administer the education it provides to children and young people. For example:

- the provision of educational services to individuals;
- monitoring and reporting on pupils'/children's educational progress;
- the provision of welfare, pastoral care and health services;
- the giving of support and guidance to children and young people, their parents and legal guardians;
- the organisation of educational events and trips;
- the planning and management of the school.

CCTV

The school uses a CCTV system which complies with the Data Protection Act and the 8 principles. The system is small and will only be used to share images with the police for crime prevention purposes. The school will also use images from time to time to deal with incidents of pupil conduct on the school premises (outside). This information, however, will not be shared with any third parties.

Welsh Government and Local Authority (LA)

The Welsh Government receives information on school pupils normally as part of the Pupil Level Annual Schools Census (PLASC). The Welsh Government may receive information on children who attend LA funded early years provision in non-maintained settings. The Welsh Government uses this personal information for research (carried out in a way that ensures individual children and young people cannot be identified) and for statistical purposes, to inform, influence and improve education policy and to monitor the performance of the education service as a whole. The LA also uses the personal information collected to do research. It uses the results of this research to make decisions on policy and the funding of schools, to calculate the performance of schools and help them to set targets. The research is carried out in a way that ensures individual children and young people cannot be identified.

In addition the Welsh Government and LAs receive information regarding National Curriculum assessment and public examination results and attendance data at individual pupil level.

Personal information held

The sort of personal information that will be held includes:

- personal details such as name, address, date of birth, child/young person identifiers and contact details for parents and guardians;
- information on any special educational needs;
- information on performance in internal and national assessments and examinations;
- information on the ethnic origin and national identity of children and young people (this is used only to prepare summary statistical analyses);
- details about children's and young people's immigration status (this is used only to prepare summary statistical analyses);
- medical information needed to keep children and young people safe while in the care of the school;
- information on attendance and any disciplinary action taken;
- information about the involvement of social services with individual children and young people where this is needed for the care of the child/young person.

Organisations which may share personal information

Information held by the school, LA and the Welsh Government on children and young people, their parents or legal guardians may also be shared with other organisations when the law allows and providing all appropriate steps are taken to keep the information secure, for example:

- other education and training bodies, including schools, when children and young people are applying for courses or training, transferring schools or seeking guidance on opportunities;
- bodies doing research for the Welsh Government, LA and schools as long as steps are taken to keep the information secure;
- central and local government for the planning and provision of educational services;
- social services and other health and welfare organisations where there is a need to share information to protect and support individual children and young people;
- Management Information System (MIS) providers in order to ensure that system functionality and accuracy is maintained;
- The Council's approved suppliers of the schools 'cashless' system to ensure all pupils, parents & guardians with parental responsibility and school staff are able to use it as appropriate;
- GL Assessment for the administration of annual cognitive ability tests (CATs) and other similar diagnostic tools to support individual learning;
- ALPS as commissioned by ERW for target setting and analysis of 6th Form performance;
- The South West and Mid-Wales Education Consortium (ERW) to support regional statistical analysis as required by Welsh Government;

- various regulatory bodies, such as ombudsmen and inspection authorities, where the law requires that information be passed on so that they can do their work;
- The Office of National Statistics (ONS) in order to improve the quality of migration and population statistics.

Sharing personal information with curriculum-based software suppliers

The school may provide limited personal (but not sensitive) information to external companies providing a curriculum-based resource (which may be on-line) which is deemed to have educational value. In these circumstances the school will ensure that all reasonable precautions are taken to preserve the security of the data in line with current legislation and that the external supplier meets all legal requirements regarding the handling of this data.

The companies and their applications currently used by the school in this way are:

Sound Training

This is a website based resource used for literacy intervention. The information the Sound Training Company can access is name, year group, date of birth and reading scores.

Maths Watch

This is software used to help pupils with their GCSE and 'A' Level Mathematics. The company can access pupil names and year group, but no other information.

Nessy Learning

Nessy.com is used in school to help pupils in the Department for Learning Support develop their literacy skills. Personal information about a child's reading and spelling ability is collected whenever they interact with the program, as well as name and date of birth.

Sumdog

Sumdog is used in school to help pupils in the Department for Learning Support develop their numeracy skills. Parent/teacher users can sign up, enter their first and last name, email address and password. Parent/teacher users then enter children's first and last name, date of birth and school login details.

Subject Access Requests

Children and young people have certain rights under the Data Protection Act, including a general right to be given access to personal data held about them by any "data controller." The presumption is that, by the age of 12, children and young people have sufficient maturity to understand their rights and to make an access request themselves if they wish. A parent would normally be expected to make a request on a child's behalf if the child is younger.

If you wish to access your personal data, or that of your child, then please contact the relevant organisation in writing. Young people aged 14 or over

The information you supply will be used by the Chief Executive of the Skills Funding Agency, to issue you with a Unique Learner Number (ULN), and to create your Personal Learning Record. The Welsh Government, LA and school will endeavour to ensure that information is kept accurate at all times. Personal information will not be sent outside the United Kingdom unless it is protected by the enhanced security arrangements associated with the Welsh Government's digital learning platform – 'Hwb'. Your rights under the Data Protection Act 1998

The Data Protection Act 1998 gives individuals certain rights in respect of personal information held on them by any organisation. These rights include:

- the right to ask for and receive copies of the personal information held on **yourself**, although some information can sometimes be legitimately withheld;
- the right, in some circumstances, to prevent the processing of personal information if doing so will cause damage or distress;
- the right to ask for wrong information to be put right;
- the right to seek compensation if an organisation does not comply with the Data Protection Act 1998 and you personally suffer damage;
- in some circumstances, the parent or legal guardian of a child or young person *may* have a right to receive a copy of personal data held about a child/young person in their legal care. Such cases will be considered on an individual basis where the individual concerned is deemed to have insufficient understanding of their rights under the Act.

You also have the right to ask the Information Commissioner, who enforces and oversees the Data Protection Act 1998, to assess whether or not the processing of personal information is likely to comply with the provisions of the Act.
