GOVERNORS' REPORT TO PARENTS

FOR ACADEMIC YEAR 2020-2021

Message from the Chair of Governors

For the past 12 months the on-going pandemic has continued to have a significant impact on schools and families across Wales. It has challenged our routine and created a new normal. During this period, we saw the implementation of new rules on how education is to be delivered face to face. We also tackled the challenges of social distancing and self-isolation of both pupils and staff. Along with the pressures this creates for many families.

Once again, the school has worked diligently with their preventative measures whilst transitioning to face-to-face education for your children. Through this work, they have managed to keep the levels of the virus at a relatively low level compared to other establishments. The governors will continue to support the school in the challenging terms ahead whilst monitoring delivery.

School intake continues in line with national expectations, with a slight reduction year on year. However, Years 12 & 13 pupil numbers continue to be strong, with a good range of subject options that provide a strong curriculum and experience for this group. The addition of the BTEC level 3 Sports Coaching and A Level Photography have been a fantastic, and popular development for the school.

Powys schools transformation continues to take shape and the new strategy is expected to last until 2030. With the focus on four main areas;

Improve learner entitlement and experience
Improve learner entitlement and experience for post 16 learners
Improve access to Welsh medium provision across all key stages
Improve provision for learners with special educational needs/ALN

I feel that the school is currently doing exceptionally well on three of these areas and is currently working hard to improve its Welsh provision within current constraints.

Finally, the governance of the school has seen significant change in 2020-21. As you may know Mr Toal (Head Teacher) retired, Dr D Rogers (Chair of Governors) and several members retired from the Board of Governors. Recently we have appointed several new governors and are now in a position of considerable strength to take the school forward in the recruitment of the new Headteacher and Deputy Head Teacher.

The Welsh Government requires that in the Governors' Report to Parents information should include the measures schools have in place to improve school attendance. Please see below details which show approaches introduced in Welshpool High School to encourage students to obtain good attendance:

- Every term certificates are given to students who have 98% and above attendance.
- Every three weeks form tutors are given whole school attendance figures.
- At the end of the academic year a trip is organised for the best attendance form in every year group.
- Every student who obtains 98% or above attendance in an academic year is entered into a draw and the winner receives an iPad.

These approaches were introduced in addition to well-established weekly monitoring with the Attendance Clerk, the Educational Welfare Officer and relevant Heads of Year.

Due to the impact of COVID, schools are not currently required to report on their attendance figures.

Work placements

Links with local businesses and organisations through our weekly work placement programme continues to be successful. A small number of students in key stage 4 attend a work placement throughout the week. As always, we are extremely grateful to the employers within our community who offer this support to some of our students.

Careers

During the summer term, Wynne Construction delivered a webinar to some of our key stage 4 students in the Theatre. Employees from Wynne Construction talked about their career pathway and progression. Students found the webinar useful in terms of motivation and inspirational.

The school continues to deliver a full range of careers and guidance provision, and engages with Careers Wales.

In the summer term a past student was appointed as the Rugby and Community Wellbeing Officer for Welshpool. Huw Williams will be working with our students during lesson time and extra -curricular activities.

PSE continues to be delivered by form tutors in school.

Our local police liaison officer came into school during the summer term to deliver a variety of workshops to students in all year groups.

Art

Nancy Clapton, Year 9 won a design competition with local company Morlands, to design a poster for their environmental campaign to encourage people to be more energy efficient. Nancy won a £50 Amazon voucher and her poster is being printed to be displayed by the company and promoted on 'My Welshpool'.

Student Council

Our Student Council remains a dedicated and focused group of students who discuss ideas to continue to improve the school experience and environment for all involved. Unfortunately, the final phases of plans to reduce the schools carbon footprint have been hampered by the lockdown due to COVID-19. We remain optimistic that once we become accustomed to the new ways of working we will be able to resume the work across the whole school.

School Prospectus

Curriculum & Educational Provision

The School provides an effective curriculum which meets the needs of the pupils.

In Key Stage 3, all National Curriculum subjects are delivered to pupils, with the addition of Drama and statutory Religious Education. The collaboration with partner primary schools to ensure consistency in curriculum provision continues to be effective. Appropriate intervention is established to support the development of Literacy and Numeracy skills through such initiatives as intervention sessions and the reading behaviours strategy. The curriculum is arranged to ensure that more able pupils are stretched to meet their potential and that more vulnerable pupils are supported through the Department for Learning Support and quality first wave teaching. The Literacy and Numeracy Framework is an integral part of provision across the curriculum and the implementation of the Digital Competency Framework continues to progress.

Preparation for the implementation of the new curriculum for Wales continues. The Policy and Curriculum Committee monitors these developments.

In Key Stage 4, the school offers a good range of general and vocational courses, including classroom and offsite provision. All of the core subjects are covered comprehensively, with all pupils following the Welsh Baccalaureate course, mostly at National (Level 2) level. In addition, most pupils complete the full course GCSE in Welsh as a 2nd Language. The school is successful in ensuring that pupils are guided effectively in making choices of study for optional subjects, and the school continues to meet the requirements of the Learning and Skills (Wales) Measure.

In the Sixth Form, a range of general and vocational courses are offered, and this offer is broadened through effective collaboration with our partners in the North Powys Consortium. All of the facilitating subjects preferred by the Russell Group of Universities are available in the offer.

Considerable transformation is underway at a county wide level, with strategic and operational management boards being established to commission and procure the curriculum offer across Powys.

Learning Support Provision

Following the retirement of Mrs Carolyn Evans, the new ALNCo is Mrs Joanne Baines. Joanne has worked in the Department for Learning Support as an SEN mathematics teacher since 2011, and has recently completed her MA Education: Leadership, Degree. Mrs Baines

is currently working towards gaining a Diploma in Trauma and Mental Health–Informed Schools and Communities; Practitioner Status.

Mrs Baines is supported in the department by Mrs Sabrina Jones and nine Teaching Assistants.

The new school year has presented a number of challenges due to the Covid pandemic, but the department is coping well with the role of supporting children who have not been able to access the mainstream for a variety of reasons.

ALN pupils, some with complex needs, are supported successfully both educationally and emotionally. The Teaching Assistants remain diligent and determined in making sure they deliver high quality, engaging activities to ensure that the best outcomes are achieved. The pupils with ALN who attend the mainstream contact groups are also supported by Teaching Assistants where possible.

Mrs Baines, Mrs Jones and the Teaching Assistants have engaged in a number of CPD training activities including Dyslexia training, Mental and Emotional Health and Well-being, Attachment Awareness, Thrive training, Speech and Language Development.

Intervention programmes and support are provided individually and in small groups to develop spelling, handwriting, reading and numeracy strategies; to increase resilience and manage anxiety. We are now able to ask for specific support for children with additional needs such as dyslexia from Powys' newly appointed specialist teachers.

Marta Kozuchowska, our Polish TA, spends time with our EAL pupils to develop their strategies for learning in both English and their first language and to mentor them as they progress from KS3 to KS4. We are looking at effectively using 'Giglets' as a reading resource for children with EAL.

The ASD Awareness training is due to be completed with new members of teaching staff and the new year 7 pupils in the near future, ensuring that we maintain our ASD Quality Award and continue to be recognised as an ASD aware school.

Person-Centred Practices are now embedded throughout the review processes in DLS. This is another step towards the transition to the new Additional Learning Needs Act (2018), which will be implemented over three years from September 2021.

Within this department a high standard of behaviour and a calm friendly atmosphere is expected. Under normal circumstances, a small number of pupils from each year group spend their free time playing games, relaxing and completing homework in a nurturing space.

Effective transition plans are put into place from Year 5/6 and continue to develop through person-centred practice throughout high school, with gradual transition through each key stage and on to further training or Year 12/13.

Close relationships continue to be built and maintained with outside agencies such as Sensory Services, Youth Intervention Service, Young Carers and the School Nurse, all

welcomed into the department to meet regularly with pupils to strengthen resilience and improve outcomes.

English Medium.

Welsh Language

We deliver Welsh Second Language only in Key Stage 3 and Key Stage 4. Welsh First Language is not offered in the curriculum.

Healthy Eating and Drinking

Powys Catering provides food and drink during lunch. The menu on offer complies in full with the Healthy Eating in Schools (Wales) Measures 2009 and the Healthy Eating in Schools (Nutritional standards and requirements) (Wales) Regulations 2003. The identity of those students on free school meals is protected by the biometric system.

Technology department – 1 staff toilet

6th Form Block/Business Partnership Centre – 1 staff toilet

Outside canteen area – 3 female staff toilets; 1 male toilet; 1 disabled toilet

Medical room – 1 toilet

Headteacher's office – 1 toilet

All toilets, sinks, taps and doors are cleaned Monday to Friday by trained staff.
